I heard a statistic that claimed something like 80% of people surveyed reported Christmas has become too commercialized. I find that ironic because every year I hear how we spent more than last year during the Christmas season. Did you know that many retailers count on Christmas for more than half of their sales for the year? The accountants are waiting with bated breath to hear the inventory numbers for the fiscal year end hoping that the shelves are mostly empty to show a streamlined business for the year-end financial reports. We seem to be forgetting that we are supposed to be celebrating Christ's Birth. In all of our preparations and purchases we seem to be ignoring Christmas.

I've never been very good about birthdays in general. But I think I understand the concept. Once a year you take the time to celebrate the birth of someone you Love. I've heard many different stories of surprise parties, gifts, and events all held in honor of the Birthday Boy or Girl. What's really cool about Birthday parties "done right" is they are as diverse as the celebrated and the celebrators. I think that's what partly deters me from doing Birthdays to be honest. I never feel like I can think of something that would properly express how I feel about someone I Love. After all, the whole point is to put aside what you enjoy and focus on presents and activities that the Celebrated person will enjoy. That can be hard to do some times.

What does Christ want for His Birthday? Isn't that a doozy? I had to really think about that one. Bu do you know what I think He wants for Christmas? The same thing he wants all year round from us.

First, He wants us to Love. Mark 12:30-31 "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'" Aside from all the frustrations and time crunch and responsibilities we feel, the one thing Christ has always tried to get into our heads is that showing Love to each other is what he says is most important.
